


Tom Mix movie at Circle Cinema

One Hundred Years Ago Today

Faced with an internal counterrevolution and a renewed German offensive, Russia signed the Treaty of Brest-Litovsk on March 3rd. Germany immediately began transferring troops, along with Generals von Hindenberg and Ludendorff who would assume command, to the Western Front. During the period of March 21st-28th, Germany launched the Somme offensive along a 50-mile wide front, her final major attempt to win WWI before American troops were fully prepared and committed to the 'meat grinder'. On the 23rd, German long range 'Paris Guns' opened fire on Paris from a distance of 75 miles, killing 256 residents. Each gun was manned by 80 Imperial Navy sailors and each shell was in flight more than three minutes. By the same date, German forces had advanced 14 miles to the Somme River and Allied forces were in retreat.

On Sunday, March 24th, Catholic and Protestant churches in Washington, DC offered prayers for Allied troops trying to stem the German 'sturmtruppen' assault. British troops were bearing the brunt of the fighting.

On March 4th, the first case of Spanish flu was officially diagnosed at Camp Funston, KS. On the 11th, the first case was diagnosed at Ft. Riley, KS. Before it petered out in the early 1920s, some 50-100 million people worldwide would die. The flu was particularly lethal for the young whose stronger immune systems flooded the lungs with body fluids in a hyper-response to the virus. As a result, many young victims drowned in their own body fluids. Movement of troops from and between training camps to East Coast port cities for embarkation to Europe facilitated the virus's rapid spread.

Political ferment continued in Europe with Finland forming an alliance with Germany on March 7th. The Russian Bolshevik Party became

the Communist Party on the 11th. Lithuania declared her independence on the 23rd and the Belorussian People's Republic was proclaimed two days later.

Here at home, the U.S. Congress approved the creation of time zones and use of Daylight Saving Time on the 19th. Daylight Saving Time went into effect on March 31st.

Famous births this month included mystery writer Mickey Spillane, born in Brooklyn, NY on March 9th. Actress Mercedes McCambridge was born in Joliet, IL on the 17th, while sportscaster Howard Cosell was born in Winston-Salem, NC on the 25th. Singer Pearl Bailey was born in Newport News, VA on March 29th, the same day Wal-Mart founder Sam Walton was born in Kingfisher, OK.

In other news, 17-year old jazz musician Louis Armstrong married 21-year old Daisy Parker on March 19th while noted French composer Claude Debussy died in Paris on the 25th.

Despite rumors to the contrary, on March 19th, John Dodge of the Dodge Brothers Motor Car Company formally announced that he would not be a candidate for U.S. senator. The March 7th issue of the Indianapolis News carried a notice from L.H. Van Briggle, receiver for the assets of the States Motor Car Company for the sale of the remaining few units of the State Touring Car, while O.M. Jones advertised his newly overhauled and repainted two-year old Chevrolet Baby Grand for sale. Gee, they don't make cars like they used to!

Thomas Flyer Won the New York to Paris Race

The Thomas Flyer is the car that won the famous New York to Paris race in 1908.

Six cars competed. In addition to the American Thomas, there was the German Protos, the Italian Brixia-Zust, and three French cars: The De Dion-Bouton, the Motobloc, and the smallest car in the race – the Sizaire-Naudin.

Body and Fenders of the Thomas Flyer were altered for the race. In fact, all the cars looked homely as peddler wagons, laden down with items needed for the long trip.

First car in trouble was the Brizia-Zust. It broke a transmission chain and its radiator cracked not long after the race began. But it was repaired.

A blizzard hampered the cars only 20 miles from starting point.

And because of the poor roads in 1908, there were many pitfalls along the way.


Going west across the U.S., the Thomas moved into the lead. Meanwhile, the Sizaire-Naudin had quit the race after less than 100 miles, because a gear broke in the rear axle and no spare parts were available. In Cedar Rapids, Iowa, the Motobloc was withdrawn because its team was discouraged.


From San Francisco, the Thomas was carried by boat to Alaska. But after the Thomas reached port April 8th, it was decided that melting snows would make an Alaskan crossing impossible.

Forewarned, the Brixia-Zust and De Dion teams were allowed to bypass the planned Alaska route, and were shipped from Seattle to Japan. The Protos was shipped to Russia, after a temporary disqualification, bypassing Japan.

Though the Protos was the first car to reach Paris (on July 26), the Thomas won by a decision because it was the only car that had attempted the full original route.

Suited to a T

By swapping wheels for skis, a creative New Hampshire Ford dealer helped give birth to the modern snowmobile.

hough the novelty of "horseless carriages" had largely worn off by 1914, the sight of Virgil White motoring through Newport, New Hampshire, that February caught the attention of the media. Under a published photo of White's unusual conveyance, parked on a snowy roadway and filled with bundled-up passengers, was this wry description: "It appears to be of Ford descent, with a tractor and a pair of skis among its ancestors. Breeders, take notice."

At a time when horse-drawn sleighs were still the top winter transport, White had found a way to make autos competitive. An Ossipee Ford dealer whose knack for tinkering belied his eighth-grade education, he swapped out the wheels on Ford's ubiquitous Model T in favor of five-foot skis in front and caterpillar-style tracks in the back. He patented his design in 1917 as—what else?—the "Snowmobile."

First marketed in 1922, the Snowmobile sold as a conversion kit for about \$400 or as a complete vehicle for \$750—which was a bit steep considering that Model T's themselves

cost less than \$300. But this "Ford on snowshoes," supposedly able to cruise through 30 inches of fresh snow at 18 mph, found early adopters among folks whose jobs regularly took them out into the worst weather: postal carriers, undertakers, firefighters, country doctors, and so on.

By the mid-1920s the company that White cofounded was making between 2,500 and 3,300 units annually at its West Ossipee plant. A Snowmobile led the 1926 funeral procession for Calvin Coolidge's father in Vermont; another went to subarctic Canada with explorer Donald MacMillan in 1927.

All too soon, the Snowmobile Company's fortunes would be buried by the rise of snowplows, with the West Ossipee plant closing in 1929. But Virgil White's creations survive to this day, as seen when collectors give them a little exercise at the Model T Ford Snowmobile Club's annual meet, usually held in New England. There, the vintage machines still sputter and clank across the winter landscape, as head-turning now as they were a century ago. —Jenn Johnson

Let me suggest we make a resolution that we can all accomplish if we put in a little effort. Sign up a new AACA member. That doesn't sound too hard does it? The world is full of


