# Antiques on Parade to Pawhuska May 5<sup>th</sup>, 2018























On May 5th club members assembled in the parking lot across from IHOP in Owasso and drove up to Bartlesville to visit the Tallgrass Prairie Reserve. It was a seven-mile drive directly north from Pawhuska to the south edge of the Joseph H. Williams Tallgrass Prairie Preserve of the Nature Conservancy. The group assembled in the parking area near the Reserve monument. Before the pavement ran out we were treated to glimpses of the buffalo who are lucky enough to be living in what is close to prehistoric conditions. Jenny and I are convinced we saw some baby calves (see above photo of mama and what looks like her baby).

After arriving at the monument, we were treated to a wonderful talk by David Turner. David and Betty have been active Docents with the Preserve for 24 years. David highlighted the fact that this area is indeed a national treasure. He said that with towns and residences so far away that here you can experience the same beautiful vistas that greeted the earliest human hunters and gatherers many thousands of years ago, and that it is truly an oasis of space and silence. At the monument we were standing at the south edge of the largest unplowed, protected tract of land remaining of the 142 million acres of tallgrass prairie grassland that once stretched from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico. Today, less than ten percent still exists, found mostly in the Flint and Osage Hill regions of Kansas and Oklahoma.

All agreed that a grand time was had by all, with many thanks to David and Betty for doing all the planning and making the arrangements.

## One Hundred Years Ago Today

In an aerial counterpoint to the Battle of Belleau Wood, Canadian air ace Billy Bishop shot down six German aircraft, including German ace Paul Bilik, over a four-day period, beginning June 1<sup>st</sup>. The Battle of Belleau Wood began on June 1st and would last until the 26<sup>th</sup>. The U.S. 2<sup>nd</sup> Division, including two brigades of Marines, in concert with French forces stopped the German advance and inflicted heavy casualties on the Kaiser's forces, despite their own heavy casualties. The Marines assaulted six times before clearing German forces from the Wood. U.S. casualties were 9,777 killed and wounded. By the time the battle was over, the Marines had earned the sobriquet 'Teufelhunden' or Devil Dogs.



In other news, one inch of snow fell in northern Pennsylvania on June 15<sup>th</sup>. Sixty-eight people lost their lives in Ivanhoe, IL on the 22<sup>nd</sup> when a circus train was rammed by a troop train. On June 28<sup>th</sup>, the first

interisland flight among the Hawaiian Islands occurred.

A provisional government opposed to the Bolsheviks was established at Vladivostok on the Russian Pacific Coast on the 29<sup>th</sup>. This would inaugurate the Russian Civil War with both sides making use of armored trains on the Trans-Siberian Railway. The following day, U.S. socialist and pacifist, Eugene Debs, was arrested on charges of denouncing the government.

Oklahoma actor Ben Johnson was born in Foraker on June  $22^{nd}$ .

The June 9<sup>th</sup> automobile section of the Tulsa World announced the enlistment of Charles Lukins as a buck private in the U.S. Army. He assured his customers that he was leaving his Cadillac dealership, the Charles Lukins Auto Company in Tulsa, in the hands of capable sales, management and service staff until his return from the service. The same edition carried advertisements for the Cole Aero Eight (Tulsa Motor Car Company) and the Tulsa Four (Tulsa Auto Sales Company located at 214-16 East Second Street), 'the car backed by Tulsa Money'. A restored example of the Tulsa Four today sits in the lobby of Tulsa International Airport. The Tulsa Four was advertised for \$1,085, or \$17,642 in modern currency.



# One Hundred Years Ago Today (cont'd)

The Spalding-Swinney Company, located at 109-115 South Denver Avenue was advertising REO heavy duty trucks, while the Ratcliff-Sanders Company was advertising Peerless models priced from \$2,550 to \$3,600. Osage Motors Corporation at Twelfth and Boston was advertising Dodge Brothers automobiles priced from \$985 to \$1,425 and Tulsa

Automobile Corporation was advertising Selden Trucks with one to five-ton ratings. If none of the above satisfied, the prospective buyer could purchase a Light Four Model 90 Overland from Overland Tulsa Company, located at First and Denver for \$850 fob Toledo, OH. The W.C. Norris Motor Company advertisement indicated this dealer carried Marmons, that Oldsmobiles, Gary Trucks and Diamond T trucks. The dealership boasted of the seven new vehicles that had just been purchased by the Western Motor Company of Miami, OK.





## 1920 Velie 48 Called "Out of the Ordinary"

During the late summer of 1919, Velie introduced its new 1920 Model 48, designed to create a new styling sensation.

The touring car (illustrated above) and other 48s had a straight-line, high cowl body with squared-off corners replacing the usual compound curves. Velie called this "The first authoritative example of the new June 1, 2017 page



style," with "a subtle combination of mirror-like planes that seem to flow into each other."

In a day when so many touring cars looked virtually alike, the new Velie was a bold adventure in styling: a deliberate look of boxiness when curves were more in fashion. Even the shape of the windshield was unique, following the angular cowl.

In addition to five- and seven-passenger touring cars and other body types, there was also a four-passenger "Tourster" with jauntily sloping rear deck and a spare tire mounted at an angle parallel to it.

The Model 48 (available in 1920 and 1921) was capable of speeds up to 60. The improved six-cylinder engine of 1920 had larger valves, and an internally heated vaporizer capable of burning low-grade fuel and giving greater gas mileage.

As 1920 began, Velie also introduced a lower-priced, smaller 34, that was more conventional in appearance. But it was this distinctive "48" that got most of the stares along the highway. It was almost an expression of "art nouveau" on wheels.

Editor's Note: Charles Schaeffer's scrapbook of almost 200 articles clipped from the Tulsa World were the creation of Tad Burness, whose biography can easily be found on the internet. The scrapbook was given to me by Mary Jean Schaeffer, who currently serves as a Board Member and club Secretary.
