Members are encouraged to drive their antique automobiles on these tours so that we can show them off to the public. We hope that each participating antique automobile will be equipped with magnetic door signs which will identify our club and give some organization to our tour. (See the article elsewhere in this newsletter on how to procure them for \$65.00 a pair). Members who don't currently have an operating antique automobile to drive are encouraged to hitch a ride with a member who does. We will not prohibit the use of modern cars but are trying to discourage their use. Participating modern cars will not display magnetic door signs and will drive at the rear of the tour. Each of these tours are proposed as caravans (follow-the-leader). All tours will occur on Saturdays. In case of really heavy all-day rain or other bad weather – stay home – tour cancelled!

The final tour of the 2018 year will be held on Saturday 6 October. This is a change of date from September for a couple of reasons. Number one, we are hoping it might be a bit cooler and allow more older cars to participate. Second, David Turner (me) is chairing the committee for the Washington County Master Gardener display at the county fair again this year and needs to be present.

The tour will be slightly different from that previously discussed in this newsletter.

Some of us will meet early for breakfast at the Owasso IHOP (where the previous two tours have assembled) and will plan to depart the Hobby Lobby parking lot across the street at 9:30 AM. We will caravan through Collinsville and onto Oolagah where we will tour the childhood home of Will Rogers. From there, we will caravan across the lake at Wiganon and on to Chelsea, OK to view the murals in the pedestrian tunnel under the old Route 66. We will likely have to split up for lunch in Chelsea but there are several good choices. After lunch, we will reassemble at the pedestrian tunnel and caravan to the totem pole park east of Foyil. This is a very interesting stop, created by a man who taught wood working for many years in Sand Springs at the boy's home. From there we will caravan to Foyil and view two monuments commemorating the "Bunion Derby" winner, who was from Foyil. After that, some will drive Route 66 home and the rest of us will caravan back to Owasso on the slower back roads.

Please plan to be a part of this fun event. We will drive only as fast as the slowest participant which is usually 40 to 45 mph.





Pawhuska Car Show

One Hundred Years Ago Today

The war on the Western Front reached a crescendo this month. The Second Battle of the Marne ended on August 6th. On the 8th, 75,000 British and Territorial forces, accompanied by 600 tanks, 2,000 guns and 1,900 aircraft broke through the German lines, advancing eight miles the first day as the Allies launched 'The Hundred Days' offensive. The Battle of Amiens was the last great battle on the Western Front and was preceded by what was probably the first use of wireless deception (radio silence). At the conclusion of the battle on August 12th, German leaders concluded that the war was now unwinnable and General Erich Ludendorff so informed the Kaiser.

Also, on August 8th, with himself and his five fellow soldiers surrounded by German troops, Private Alvin York went on the attack, shooting 20 Germans and capturing 132 more. York would win the U.S. Congressional Medal of Honor for his actions.

In other war news, Japan announced on the 2nd that it was sending troops to Siberia to protect supplies that had been shipped to Vladivostok and stockpiled by the Allies. On August 4th, an unknown German corporal named Adolf Hitler was awarded the Iron Cross, First Class for bravery. Ironically, it was upon the recommendation of his commanding officer, Jewish Lt. Hugo Gutmann.

In other world news, Czechoslovakia formed an independent republic on August 30th, the same date that Fanya Kaplan attempted to assassinate Russian leader Lenin.

BMW was established as a public company in Germany on the 13th. In New York City,

Irving Berlin's musical 'Yip Yip Yaphank' debuted on Broadway.

In sports, the Cubs won the earliest National League pennant ever on August 24th. The Red Sox followed by winning the earliest American League pennant ever on the 31st.

Famous births for this month included author Jacqueline Susanne, born in Philadelphia, PA on August 20th. Conductor Leonard Bernstein was born in Lawrence, MA on the 25th. Baseball great Ted Williams was born in San Diego, CA on the 30th, while lyricist Alan Jay Lerner (Lerner & Lowe) was born in New York City on August 31st.

The American Automobile Digest for this month of August carried an article by Mr. E.F. Pollock who had developed an automotive maintenance 'system'. The 'system' he created similar to the maintenance verv instructions that can be found in much later cars' handbooks, grouping various tasks by the frequency that they should be undertaken. For example, the Daily oiling tasks are as follows: water pump, track rod ends, spring shackles front & rear, and all brake linkages. This would be in addition to checking the level of water in the radiator, replenishing the gasoline tank, closely monitoring the oil pressure gauge for instantaneous readout on firing up the engine, and checking that tyres (sic) were properly inflated and devoid of cuts, pieces of glass and other undesirables. After performing this level of maintenance daily, one wonders when Mr. Pollock found the time to drive the car.





Marmon - America's "First" Fine Small Car

The Little Marmon ... built at Indianapolis!

In 1927 considerable buyer interest was shown in straight-eight engines, smaller cars, and in glass-windowed convertible cabriolets (that combined the comfort of a closed car with the fresh-air openness of a roadster).

All three of these selling points were displayed in the Little Marmon. It was an entirely new model series, and also available in a range of other body types. It was the first of many to be heralded as "America's first truly fine small car." The Little Marmon represented more than two years of development. Marmon management believed that many buyers would want a luxurious small car bearing the Marmon name ... and priced well under \$2,000.

A companion to the long-established big Marmon Six, the new model went on display January 8, 1927, at New York's annual Automobile Show. It was successful enough that the Marmon people would decide to phase out the high-priced six the next year.

"Equa-distant" down-draft manifold system made it possible for the gasoline vapor to travel in an equal amount to all eight cylinders, so that those on either end would not be "starved" for fuel. And the new hyphoid rear axle made possible a lower floor without needing a drive-train "tunnel" or sacrificing headroom.

The Little Marmon had the longest springs in proportion to its wheelbase of any car in the world (all but 22" of the wheelbase spring length), and springs were anchored to the frame with rubber knuckles. Shock absorbers: Lovejoy hydraulic type. Automatic oil primer lubricated upper cylinders when engine was started.

Four-wheel brakes were mechanical, self-energizing. Radiator was styled in traditional Marmon arch. A clock was standard equipment, as was a permanently attached gas cap.

Marmon built two eights in '28: the "63" and "78" series. But all Little Marmons are 1927 models.






Car Show Windshield Cards
