

One Hundred Years Ago Today

This was a month for post-war treaties that remade the map of Europe. The Peace of Neuilly-sur-Seine between the allies and Bulgaria went into effect on August 9th. The following day the allies recognized the new nations of Poland, Czechoslovakia and Romania. Also, on the 10th, the Treaty of Sevres was signed by allied and Turkish representatives. Turkey renounced her claim to Israel and recognized the British Mandate.

Under the terms of the 1st Peace of Riga, the Soviet Union recognized the independence of Latvia. The Battle of Warsaw between Poland and the Soviet Union began on August 12th, followed by a Soviet defeat on the 15th and a final decisive defeat by Polish forces under Marshall Józef Pilsudski on the 25th. The battle became known as 'The Miracle on the Vistula'.

The first U.S. commercial radio station 8MK (WWJ) began daily broadcasts from Detroit on August 20th. The station broadcast its first news program on the 31st.

In the sports world, the first post-war Olympiad began in Antwerp, Belgium on August 14th. The only major league baseball fatality in history occurred on the 16th when Cleveland Indians' player Ray Chapman took a pitch to the head from Yankees pitcher Carl Mays. Chapman died the following day. The American Professional Football League (forerunner of the NFL) was formed in Akron, Ohio on August 20th, with Jim Thorpe elected the first league president.

Famous births this month included talk show host Mike Douglas, born in Chicago, IL on August 11th. American soldier and actor Neville Brand was born in Griswold, IA on the 13th. Singer Georgia Gibbs was born in Worcester, MA on the 17th and actress Shelley Winters was born in St. Louis, MO the following day. Finally, American sci-fi author Ray Bradbury was born in Waukegan, IL on August 22nd.


This month's issue of Popular Science included an article on the process manufacturers were using to achieve a high-gloss auto body finish. The body was heated to remove dirt and grease prior to being dipped in a tank of 'water japan' and then baked in an oven. The water japan, an emulsion of asphalt, linseed oil and water, eliminated the buildup of solvent vapors in the oven after several bodies had been baked, thus eliminating an explosion hazard. The result was a high-gloss finish.

The same issue described the features of a new German 'fliverette', a small 450-pound electric automobile powered by a 24-volt electric motor and a 14-cell battery. The fliverette was intended as a vehicle which would allow the poor to escape 'the clatter and stuffy odors of the city'. The vehicle seated one passenger but with the addition of a small trailer could seat an additional adult passenger or three children. As with today's electric automobiles, a charging station could be purchased for the home for a nominal charge. Top speed was advertised as 25 MPH.

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



LaSalle Name Ended in All-Cadillac Move

The 1940 LaSalle was the last of a famous line of cars built by Cadillac Division of General Motors.

The LaSalle was available from 1927 to 1940. It was a lower-priced running mate to the General Motors luxurious Cadillac.

During many of those years, the LaSalle closely resembled the Cadillac, mechanically and in style, except for a period from 1934 to 1936, when LaSalle switched to a straight-eight engine and introduced its soon-to-become-famous high, narrow grille.

The LaSalle was highly thought of, so why was it discontinued? The reason: Cadillac management decided all of the Cadillac's products should bear the Cadillac nameplate, that there should be no cut-rate "substitute" for a Cadillac.

They decided that for 1941, a reasonably priced Cadillac "61" series (new and priced from \$1,345) should replace the LaSalle.

From time to time, there were rumors that the LaSalle name might be revived.

Cadillac's luxury compact Seville, which was unveiled in mid-1975, was tentatively planned to be called the LsSalle II. The Seville would be one of the most successful lines for Cadillac.

Running boards were optional on the 1940 LaSalle, a car that was never common. It's reported that only 10,380 of the "50" series were built, and 13,750 of the Special series "52" (illustrated above).

Editor's Note: Charles Schaeffer's scrapbook of almost 200 articles clipped from the Tulsa World were the creation of Tad Burness, whose biography can easily be found on the internet. The scrapbook was given to me by Mary Jean Schaeffer, Charles' widow and fellow AACA Tulsa Region club member..
