One Hundred Years Ago Today

International politics dominated the news this month. On February 2nd, Estonia and Russia agreed to Estonian independence which became effective on the 24th. Also, on the 2nd, France occupied the German territory of Memel. On February 6th, the Saarland, that buffer zone between France and Germany, came under League of Nations administration.

Admiral Kolchak surrendered his White force to Red troops on the 7th and was immediately executed. Bolshevik troops captured Odessa the following day, ending foreign involvement in the Russian civil war.

The League of Nations recognized the perpetual neutrality of Switzerland on February 13th, allowing Switzerland to rejoin the League. The Netherlands joined the League on the 19th. On February 29th, the new nation of Czechoslovakia adopted a constitution. But perhaps most ominously of all, the National Socialist German Workers (Nazi) Party was founded in the Hofbrauhaus in Munich on the 24th, however, former Austrian army corporal Adolf Hitler was not yet a member.

In other news, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police was founded on February 1st by the merger of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police and the Dominion Police. The League of Women Voters was founded in Chicago on the 14th.

In the sports world, baseball outlawed all pitches involving tampering with the ball on February 10th. The National Negro Baseball League was founded on the 13th.

Famous birthdays this month included TV game show host Bill Cullen, born in Pittsburg on the 18th and actor Jack Palance (Vladimir Palahniuk), born in Lattimer Mines, PA on the same date. Actor Tony Randall (Leonard Rosenberg) was born in Tulsa, OK on February 26th. Obituaries this month included Arctic explorer, Robert Peary.

In the automotive world, the first commercial armored car was introduced in St. Paul, MN on February 1st. Perhaps by coincidence, this month's issue of Popular Mechanics included an article describing the design of a new 'auto-bandit chaser' intended for the Denver police force. The vehicle specifications called for a 90 HP armored car with high speed capability. The second and third seats were to be elevated to allow officers to fire their trench guns over the heads of fellow officers. The vehicle was to be equipped with a ram prow to crash through fences in pursuits on the flat prairies east of the city and fenders were skirted to allow another vehicle to be forced into the ditch without damaging the vehicle's tires. Finally, the car had no windshield or top to obscure vision. Hope the city was providing officers with goggles.

In recognition of the need for turn signals and brake lights, the conscientious motorist could now purchase a small battery-powered signal light that he could attach to the back of his hand for night-time

hand signaling purposes. The auto traveler could also purchase cabinets and mount them above the rear fenders and on the running boards to hold picnic items, medical supplies or spare parts. What would they think of next? A trunk, maybe?





1936 Plymouth Engine Swap – Part Two

I have made good progress on the engine swap project. While the old engine is out, the new one is some time away from going in due to project creep. By that I mean, the project is now including a lot more than a simple engine transplant. I suspect all of us have utter the phase, "Well while I have it apart, I might as well take care of.....". That is the simple definition of project creep. Here are two that have crept into my engine swap project.

First: "While I have it apart would be the perfect time to repaint the frame and front suspension." It has seen a bit of wear since Bob repainted it twenty some years ago and a refreshing is in order with the clean new engine.

Second: "While I have it apart would be the perfect time to rework the right front fender that has a crack in it and a damaged brace that needs to be straightened and reattached." This is the creep that has caused the most project inflation. Since I needed to remove the fenders and radiator shell to allow me to do the swap in my crowded garage, I thought this would be the perfect time to rework the fender.

After I removed it, I took it to the Auburn-Cord-Duesenberg Company in Broken Arrow and had it media blasted. I knew it had a bit of filler in it that was now cracking out due to the damaged brace and the crack in the fender. I also knew it had been repaired from collision damage when someone hit the fender and running board and inflected significant damage. When I got the car from Bob, the only clear evidence of the damage was the repaired tread on the running board. However, filler was now cracking out around the trailing edge of the fender and I wanted to get that all repaired as well. Hence the fender was completely stripped in the media blasting. I was surprised at the amount of damage repair that had been done to the trailing edge of the fender. It had been disguised well with the filler and paint, but it soon became obvious that the fender was not square across the back. I had previously realized that the fender, as repaired, was wider than original. I learned that after replacing the running boards with new ones, and discovered the fender was about 1/2" wider than the new running board. It dawned on me then that the repaired original running board had simply been repaired to match the width of the repaired fender. I was also surprised to learn that the fender had considerable lead in it from the original repair. By now, I realized I was in over my head on this fender project.

Joe Smith suggested I give the project to Dennis Francis, who has *Wheels of the Past* near Agra, OK, to do the repairs. Our Region has visited his shop at least twice that I recall and as recently as last year. I gave him a call and he sounded quite interested. I got the fender back on December 29th and could not be more pleased. His work is simply incredible. He had my other fender as a "go by" and discovered that the fender as I gave it to him was not only too wide at the rear, but also too long! It is now correct! He does advertise that he works only on 1940 and older vehicles but that might be negotiable.



Now that the fender is again the correct length, it fits properly to the radiator shell. thrilled. Hopefully, the hood will now fit properly on both sides!

All four fenders, both headlights and the taillight are all currently at the painter's shop being prepped and repainted black. More progress next month (I hope!)

Comet Grew Wilder With Passing Years

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Introduced during 1960, the COMET from Ford's Lincoln-Mercury Division first began its career as a tame economy compact; a more luxurious running-mate for the Ford Falcon. However, like many other economy compacts, it grew wilder as the years went by!

For 1964 there were many changes. The '64 grille has always reminded me of the head of an electric shaver, though I wonder if many others think of such a resemblance ...?

The word "caliente" means "hot" in Spanish. The name given to Comet's top-of-the-line series for '64.

In those days, "muscle cars" were on the ascendancy, and in June, '64, Lincoln-Mercury advertised "COMET: BOSS DRAGSTER."

A high-riding, souped-up Comet dragster was illustrated, and Comet drag-racing records were listed, such as on January 5th, at Emporia, VA: 11.30 seconds from 0 to 123 m.p.h.!

This and other triumphs were accomplished by non-stock models with 427 c.i.d. V-8s, but the participation of Ford-built cars in racing helped arouse the interest of speed minded buyers.

A new 20-gallon fuel tank increased cruising range by 40 percent. With four engine choices, one could pick anything from a pussy-cat to a lion.

By the Spring of 1964, the Comet "CYCLONE" appeared. It featured less side chrome, bucket seats, tachometer, competition-type wheel covers, and the "289" V-8 with chrome engine fittings. A vinyl-covered roof was optional.

All this brings back memories of lower-priced gasoline and higher speed limits!
