Minutes of the August Tulsa Region AACA General Meeting at Joanna Cooper's Car Emporium August 1, 2021

David Turner called the meeting to order a little after 2:00 pm. He announced that Jim Hasselbrack was attending the meeting, being the second meeting, he has attended since joining the club last year. There was one other guest at the meeting.

The business meeting was paused for the ice cream social.

On returning to the business meeting, the pledge of allegiance was recited.

David then stated that the minutes of the July meeting was in the Running Board Ramblings and ask for corrections. Joe Smith responded in a very loud voice that he didn't volunteer to prepare the Power Point presentation for the Tour Banquet. Chuck Mahan then gave the Treasurer's report over the phone.

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One Hundred Years Ago Today

Sports events were in the headlines this month. On September 5th, major league pitcher Walter Johnson set a strikeout record of 2,287. On the 26th, Yankees' slugger Babe Ruth hit home run numbers 57 and 58 to defeat the Indians 8-7. The following day swimmer Johnny Weissmuller set his first two world records in the 100-meter and 150-yard freestyle events at the AAU National meet in Brighton Beach, NY.

The first Miss America Pageant was held in Atlantic City on September 7th-8th. Miss Margaret Gorman of Washington, DC was crowned the first Miss America.

In other news, the Belgian Communist Party, KPB, was founded on the 3rd. Guatemala, Honduras, and San Salvador agreed to form the Central American Union on September 9th.

A storage silo containing 400 tons of ammonium nitrate and ammonium sulfate at a BASF fertilizer plant in Oppau, Germany exploded, killing 500-600 people on the 21st. The League of Nations accepted independent Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania into membership on September 22nd.

Famous birthdays this month included Arthur Ferrante (of Ferrante & Teicher and "Exodus" fame), born in New York City on September 7th. Sportscaster Jim McKay was born in Philadelphia, PA on the 24th while actress Deborah Kerr was born in Helensburg, Scotland on September 30th.

In other personal news, author Ernest Hemingway wed Hadley Richardson of St. Louis, MO on the 3rd.

Calculations in this month's issue of Popular Mechanics showed that the global cost of World War I was \$350B. The U.S.'s share of that figure was \$24B. The War Department's budget had increased

Several new devices for improvement of automotive function and efficiency were announced this A new aftermarket front month. bumper that could be converted into a tow bar was now available. As a preview to the numerous cupholders in today's automobiles, a combination cigar ash receptacle, drinking cup and vase that could be attached to the vehicle upholstery was now available. Hopefully one wasn't using it as an ash tray and a drinking cup at the same time!

Α new dash-mounted temperature gauge was now available to stop theft of radiator-mounted temperature gauges. The device was actuated by an ether-filled cylindrical bulb placed in the engine's water jacket and connected to the gauge by a thin hollow tube. The ether would expand when heated. applying pressure via a spring and gears to the gauge pointer.

1966 Ford Country Squire



To comply with the implementation of safety regulations in the United States, many running changes were made during this generation, effectively standardizing the equipment introduced by the Lifeguard option package. For 1966, Ford standardized front and rear seat belts, a padded dashboard and sun visors, a deep-dish steering wheel, reinforced door latches, and emergency flashers.^[23] For 1967, as part of federal regulations, the steering wheel was fitted with a padded center and fitted to an energy-absorbing (collapsible) steering column; other requirements included padded interior surfaces, recessed controls on the instrument panel, and front outboard shoulder belt anchors. As an added degree of redundancy, a dual-chamber brake master cylinder was added for the 1968 model year (on the Country Squire, alongside all other vehicles sold in the United States).

Chassis specifications[edit]

The rear-wheel drive <u>1965 Ford</u> chassis used by the sixth-generation Country Squire retained the 119-inch wheelbase of the previous generation. For higher strength and rigidity, the frame rails became fully boxed;^[24] the perimeter frame configuration was



retained. While again using a double-wishbone, ball-jointed A-arm configuration for the front suspension, the front track width was widened to improve handling.^[24] The rear leaf springs were discontinued, replaced with a three-link coil-sprung solid rear axle;^[24] in various forms, Ford would use this suspension configuration on rear-wheel drive full-size vehicles through the production of the final Ford Crown Victoria in 2011.

Powertrain[edit]

For the sixth generation, the Country Squire (alongside Ford full-size cars and F-Series trucks) received a new standard engine, with a 240 cubic-inch "Big Six" inline-6 (producing 150 hp) replacing the 223 cubic-inch "Mileage Maker" six.^[24] The three V8 engines were retained from the previous generations, with a 200 hp 289 cubic-inch V8, a 250 hp 352 cubic-inch V8, and a 300 hp 390 cubic-inch V8.^[24] For 1966, two versions of the 390 were introduced, producing 275 hp (2-bbl) or 315 hp (4-bbl). For the first time, a 428 cubic-inch V8 was offered on the Country Squire, producing 345 hp.^[23] For 1967, the 352 FE V8 was dropped, largely replaced by the 2-bbl version of the 390 (producing 270 hp).^[25] For 1968, the 289 was expanded to 302 cu in (4.9 L), producing 210 hp.^[26] The 2-bbl 390 and 428 were retuned, making 265 and 340 hp, respectively.^[26]

For the sixth-generation Country Squire, the 3-speed column-shifted manual made its return, along with the 4-speed overdrive manual.^[23] For 1967 only, a floor-shifted 4-speed manual was offered for the Country Squire (only with the 390 and 428 V8s). The Fordomatic 3-speed automatic was retired, with Cruise-O-Matic replaced by several 3-speed automatic designs marketed under the SelectShift name; the <u>C4</u> was developed for inline-6 and small V8s, while the <u>C6</u> was developed for large V8s; the <u>FMX</u> was introduced for medium-size engines in 1968.

Body[<u>edit</u>]

For the sixth generation, the Country Squire again shared its doors with four-door Ford sedans. While the roofline of the Country Squire was shared with the Mercury Colony Park, the two model lines shared different bodywork below the window lines (including front facias and rear quarter panels). In a major styling change, full-size Ford's adopted vertically stacked headlamps, raising the hood line, and enlarging the grille.

In a design change that would last through its 1991 discontinuation, the 1965 Country Squire replaced the third-row rear seat configuration for two (optional) flat-folding rear seats facing towards the center of the cargo area, expanding seating to 10 passengers.^[27] Coinciding with all full-size Fords, the Country Squire adopted two-sided keys for 1965, introducing a <u>valet key</u> (while unlocking the front doors and starting the car, the key would not unlock the glovebox and rear cargo door).

For the 1965 model year, the full-size Ford model line underwent a complete redesign with an all-new chassis. Alongside the introduction of the <u>Ford LTD</u>, the Country Squire was a counterpart of the Galaxie 500 model line alongside the non-woodgrain Country Sedan (alongside the standard Galaxie).



During the production of the sixth-generation Country Squire, wood-trimmed station wagons (in simulated form) underwent a revival in production. Previously exclusive to Ford and Mercury from 1954 to 1965, counterpart station wagons entered production during the end of the 1960s. For 1966, Chrysler reintroduced wood trim for the <u>Town & Country</u> station wagon (and for the first <u>Dodge Monaco</u> station wagon). General Motors introduced wood trim for the 1966 <u>Chevrolet Caprice Estate</u> and in 1967 for the <u>Buick</u> <u>Sport Wagon</u> and <u>Oldsmobile Vista Cruiser</u>. As part of the 1968 introduction of the Ford Torino and Mercury Montego, a Torino Squire and Montego Villager station wagon were introduced with woodgrain exterior trim.

As the LTD became a full model line for the 1968 model year, the Country Squire became its station wagon counterpart, with Ford adding "LTD" badging to the hood.^{[21][22]}

Growing Up In The 1960's

When I was about 8 or 9 years old, I got my first lawn mower. I think I paid \$5 for it. It was basically a used piece of junk, but it worked, sometimes. Do you remember the Briggs and Stratton engines with wind up starters? You folded the handle out and then wound it up several revolutions and when you folded it back it would release the spring that turned the engine to start it. It met its demise when I hit a steel pipe sticking out of the ground and bent the crankshaft but with the money I had made cutting yards I bought a brand-new Sears Craftsman mower. I wanted the self-propelled model, but it cost more so I had to settle for the push type. I paid for the mower, then we went to the pickup counter outside, gave the clerk the sales ticket, and he went back in the warehouse and brought out the big cardboard box on a dolly and then put it in the trunk of my dad's '56 Buick. What a surprise when we got home and unpacked the mower. The clerk had made a mistake and gave us the self-propelled model. I was thrilled, but only for a moment. My dad said we didn't pay for that mower and to keep it would be stealing. He made me call Sears and tell them what happened. Much to my surprise, they told me to keep the mower. I made a lot of money cutting grass with that mower but unfortunately, it was stolen out of our garage a few years later.

I was now 12 and wanted a paper route delivering newspapers for the Courier Journal but you had to be at least 14. No problem. A kid I knew in the neighborhood was 15 so he got two routes and let me run one of them. I did all the work, and he took a cut of the profit. I would get up at 3:30 AM every morning, ride my bike to the corner drop off about two blocks away, pickup my papers and then deliver them. Home by 7:00 in time for breakfast and then off to school. Right after school about 3:30 I would go to the drop off corner, pick up the evening edition, make my deliveries and home by 5:30 for supper. There was only one edition on Sunday, but it was much thicker so no bicycle delivery. I had to walk. Back then you had to collect the money from all your customers so that meant knocking on doors at night. When I turned 14 the kid that got the route for me was 17 so he gave me both of his routes since he got a job at a gas station. With two paper routes, I was really making bank. Good thing, since I had my sights set on something big in two years, a car.

Can you imagine a 12-year-old kid riding his bike alone in the streets at 3:30 AM today? Or how about going door to door collecting money at 9:00 PM? The 1960's were a golden time to be growing up. I wish our world was still like it today.
