One Hundred Years Ago Today

Russia continued to disintegrate. During the period of December 9th through the 18th, Finland, Lithuania and Moldavia declared their independence from Russia. On December 15th, Russia reached an armistice with the Central Powers. Lenin formed the Cheka, predecessor to the KGB, under the leadership of Felix Dzerzhinsky on the 20th.

In other news, the French ammunition ship Mont Blanc exploded in Halifax, Nova Scotia's harbor on December 6th, killing 1,700. In Houston, TX, 13 black soldiers were hanged on the 11th for participating in a riot. On December 18th, the U.S. Congress approved the 18th Amendment (Prohibition) and sent it to the States for approval.

In war news, the U.S. declared war on Austria-Hungary on the 7th while the 42nd (Rainbow) Division arrived in France on the same date. General Allenby's British forces captured Jerusalem on December 9th. In the U.S., Navy Secretary Daniels announced on the 9th that the Navy had 428 ships under construction. The federal government took control of the railroads for the duration of the war on the 26th.

The one bright spot in this month's news was the founding of Boys' Town outside Omaha, NE by Father Flanagan.

Famous births this month included sci-fi author Arthur C. Clarke (2001: A Space Odyssey), born in Minehead, England on December 16th. TV game show host Gene Rayburn was born in Christopher, IL on the 22nd, while former Los Angeles mayor Tom Bradley was born in Calvert, TX on the 29th.

On December 24th, flyer Jimmy Doolittle married his high school sweetheart, Josephine Daniels.

Along with other manufacturers, Overland was advertising its Model 90 Light Four sedan as a Christmas gift for the entire family. Amenities included rollup windows, a dome light, three silk roller curtains, rear seat parcel pockets, foot rail, a windshield wiper, electric starter and lighting, cloth upholstery and floor carpeting. Price was advertised as \$1,240 (\$23,895 in current dollars) F.O.B. Toledo.


Late Christmas shoppers could find a variety of gifts at Goldenberg's Department Store in Washington, DC, for example, perfume at \$.12 per boxed bottle, American character dolls for \$1.00, tricycles for \$4.50, double bed seamless sheets for \$.98 and assorted gold jewelry starting at \$.98.

American "Sammies" (doughboys) in training camps were being promised a spectacular Christmas, with newly constructed playhouses in larger camps presenting plays. The government promised only the bare minimum of guard and police duty on Christmas Day. The government, YMCA and local churches also promised bountiful Christmas lunches and dinners. Mounds of oranges, candy, cigarettes and cigars were available for distribution to the troops. At the front, packages of cigarettes, pipe tobacco, candy, nuts and raisins were being distributed to American troops. Displaying the usual American generosity, Christmas trees were being erected in rear line hospitals and decorated with hundreds of sweaters and baby caps for impoverished French children. Thus did the America people celebrate their World War I Christmas.



Joe's 1927 Chevrolet Owner's Manual Index



Excerpts from 1927 CHEVROLET Owner's Manual

By Joe Smith (continued)

My Favorite from Page 20 – "In order that you may get the maximum enjoyment and comfort out of your car, you must be considerate and thoughtful about it as you would of a fine horse that is as fine and costly as your car."

Page 7 – "The degree of success encountered in the use of any automobile, regardless of price or kind, is a direct result of and in direct proportion to, the thought and effort expended in caring for that automobile."

Page 10 - "Be sure you know just how to operate the door lock and save the annoyance of a broken key."

Page 18 – "Braking Effects – the locked rear wheels will slide over the ground with the most destructive effect on the tires."

Page 20 – "We recommend the use of a good "stop Light" – as well as bumpers. NOTE: CHEVROLET did not have bumpers on their cars as a standard or option in 1927. Often dealers would sell you non-CHEVROLET bumpers and install them."

Page 20 – "Don't tinker. Half the ability to make an adjustment or repair is the ability to discover its necessity."

Page 38 – "Testing Fuel – A very simple yet practical way of testing fuel to determine if it is suitable for your car is to put a tablespoon full of the fuel into a clean porcelain dish or cup; ignite it and allow it to burn until all the fuel has been consumed, being careful to protect it from air currents or drafts. The amount and quality of the residue left on the bottom and sides of the porcelain dish are an indication of the quality of the fuel. If the bottom of the cup is practically clean, the sides free of soot, the fuel is good; if a heavy deposit of soot is left on the walls of the cup or a quantity of heavy oily or tarry substance on the bottom of the vessel, the fuel is of poor quality. Between these two results – a clean fuel and one that leaves a heavy residue – lies the quality ranging from good to bad."

Page 63 – "Winter Storage of Cars – When it is found necessary to store the car during the winter months, the car should be well lubricated, all water should be drained from the radiator and motor, after which the engine should be run under its own power until it becomes thoroughly heated. Do not run the motor too fast, but keep it going long enough to evaporate every particle of water that may be "pocketed" to prevent the water freezing and possibly bursting jackets. ... All bright metal parts should be thoroughly coated with slab oil, Vaseline, cosmic or gun grease to prevent rusting."

Page 65 – "You can prevent the formation of ice on the windshield glass by rubbing the glass with a piece of cloth saturated with pure glycerin."



LaSalle Name Ended in All-Cadillac Move

The 1940 LaSalle was the last of a famous line of cars built by Cadillac Division of General Motors.

The LaSalle was available from 1927 to 1940. It was a lower-priced running mate to the General Motors luxurious Cadillac.

During many of those years, the LaSalle closely resembled the Cadillac, mechanically and in style, except for a period from 1934 to 1936, when LaSalle switched to a straight-eight engine and introduced its soon-to-become-famous high, narrow grille.

The LaSalle was highly thought of, so why was it discontinued? The reason: Cadillac management decided all of the Cadillac's products should bear the Cadillac nameplate, that there should be no cut-rate "substitute" for a Cadillac.


They decided that for 1941, a reasonably priced Cadillac "61" series (new and priced from \$1,345) should replace the LaSalle.

From time to time, there were rumors that the LaSalle name might be revived.

Cadillac's luxury compact Seville, which was unveiled in mid-1975, was tentatively planned to be called the LsSalle II. The Seville would be one of the most successful lines for Cadillac.

Running boards were optional on the 1940 LaSalle, a car that was never common. It's reported that only 10,380 of the "50" series were built, and 13,750 of the Special series "52" (illustrated below).
