2019 FOUNDERS TOUR JUNE 2 - 7 2019 Seward Nebraska

Seward Nebraska, a town of about 7000, has been selected as the host site for the 2019 Founders Tour. Seward is 6 miles off 1-80, and just west of Lincoln Nebraska. It is known for being Nebraska's 4th of July and Christmas City. It is home of Concordia University-Nebraska.

Destinations for the tour will be the Genoa Indian Industrial School Interpretive Center which was used to educate native Americans from 1884-1934; historic Nebraska City, a town on the banks of the Missouri River which served as a terminus for virtually all freight headed to the west prior to the completion of the transcontinental rail road. We will visit Homestead National Monument, site of what is regarded as the first American homestead. Other destinations include the Speedway Museum of American Speed in Lincoln, and the Clayton Museum of Ancient History which has a collection of ancient Roman artifacts in York NE.

Registrations will be limited so early reservations are encouraged. We are recommending use of two motels. The Cobblestone Inn which is a newer two story hotel but does not have an elevator. The other is the East Hills Inn and Suites. This motel is an older recently remodeled facility and has outside entrances, most rooms accessible without steps. Our headquarters will be at the Living Word Lutheran Church. There is ample trailer parking space in the church parking lot.

Be sure to ask for the AACA Founders Tour rate when making reservations.

One Hundred Years Ago Today

Once again, political unrest dominated the world's headlines. On June 6th, Finland declared war on the Bolsheviks. Opposed to the dismemberment of Turkey by the Allies, Ataturk formed his Turkish National Congress in Ankara on the 19th. Rather than sign the Treaty of Versailles, German Chancellor Phillipp Scheidemann resigned on June 20th. A new government was formed the following day. Also, on June 21st, German navy crews, feeling betrayed by the Versailles Treaty, scuttled their ships interned at Britain's Scapa Flow Naval Base. Incensed by this act of bad faith, the June 24th issue of the Leadville, CO *Herald Democrat* demanded an immediate indemnity of \$70M from Germany. The Spartacus Revolt occurred in Hamburg on the 25th.

On the 28th, German emissaries were escorted into the Palace of Versailles to sign the Treaty ending World War I. When they questioned the blank indemnity clause in the treaty, they were told that Germany would be told when she had paid enough and that if they did not sign,

Allied guns would open on Germany at noon. Backed into a corner, the Germans signed. However, as he and his entourage left Paris, British Prime Minister Lloyd George remarked to an aide that "We'll be back at them again in twenty years." He was only off by three months.

Here at home, the U.S. Congress passed the 19th Amendment (women's suffrage) on June 4th. On June 14th, the first transatlantic flight left Newfoundland, piloted by Brown and Alcock, landing in Ireland the following day.

On the evening of June 2nd, powerful bombs exploded in seven American cities. A night watchman was killed in New York City and a senator's maid lost both hands. The bombs were the work of anarchists who advocated an end to laws and capitalism. Included among the bombing sites was the home of Attorney General Mitchell Palmer. None of the men targeted by the bombers was killed. Palmer responded by appointing a young lawyer, J. Edgar Hoover, to work with the Bureau of

Investigation to track down the perpetrators. Despite the deportation of several anarchists to Russia, the bombings were never solved.

In the sports world, J. Loftus, riding Sir Barton, won the 51st Preakness and the Triple Crown on the 11th. On a lighter note, Billy De Beck premiered his 'Barney Google' comic strip on the 17th.

Elsewhere, a steel strike began in France on June 9th. The world's first advanced airliner, the Fokker F13, took to the air on its maiden flight on the 25th.

Famous births this month included actor Gene Barry (TV's Bat

Masterson), born in New York City on June 14th. Rodeo performer and actor Slim Pickens was born in Kingsbury, CA on the 29th.

Famous weddings this month included that of Albert Einstein who married his cousin, Elsa Lowenthal, on June 2nd. Returning Army captain Harry Truman married Bess Wallace in Independence, MO on June 28th.



Studebaker Returned to Basic Style in '52

Because Studebaker in mid-1946 had introduced an amazing new postwar body style, only minor body changes were made until the 1950's appeared.

Then for 1950 and 1951, Studebaker grafted on a shockingly different "bullet-nose" front end.

Some thought it attractive, but others thought it a horrifying mutation. The bullet-nose was not widely accepted.

For 1952, Studebaker decided to return to a more conventional front end appearance and adopted a very low and very wide grille.

And a new offering for 1952 was Studebaker's version of the hardtop convertible coupe, the pillarless Starliner (illustrated above). The Starliner was included in the six-cylinder Champion and V-8 Commander series.

And 1952 was Studebaker's 100th anniversary. The founders were Henry and Clem Studebaker, and their early products were horse-drawn vehicles.

Beginning as a "\$68 wagon shop," H. & C. Studebaker's business grew when they got an order in 1857 to build, for the U.S. Army, 100 military wagons in six months. John M. Studebaker, a brother, joined the company and invested \$8,000 he had earned in California by building wheelbarrows for the gold prospectors.

As Studebaker celebrated its 100th anniversary, a special centenary record album was issued, narrated by actor Raymond Massey, with songs and stories about the company's illustrious history.

Studebaker's final car was the 1966 model and was assembled in the Canadian branch factory. Until 1964, the main headquarters had been at South Bend, Indiana.

Editor's Note: Charles Schaeffer's scrapbook of almost 200 articles clipped from the Tulsa World were the creation of Tad Burness, whose biography can easily be found on the internet. The scrapbook was given to me by Mary Jean Schaeffer, who currently serves as a Board Member and club Secretary.

Car Show Windshield Cards

As announced at the meeting a few months ago, I am willing to make laminated windshield cards for any member who wishes one for their car(s). All I ask is \$3.00 to cover the cost of materials and laminating. The lamination is 10 mils thick and quite rigid. As a result, they should be less likely to blow off the windshield in a heavy wind.
